.406 batting average—a record for 80 yrs

80 years ago this week, baseball player Ted Williams (1918-2002) of the Boston Red Sox finished the season with a .406 batting average. No major league player since



Williams has ever achieved an average higher than .400-which translates to getting a hit 4 times during every 10 trips to the plate.

Though he had offers from the St. Louis Cardinals and the New York Yankees while he was still in high school, his mother thought he was too young to leave home, so he signed up with the local minor league club in San Diego, and-despite respiratory problems that would plague him for the rest of his life-soon became a triple-threat, dominating in batting average, home runs, and runs batted in.

He signed with the Red Sox-and stayed with the team during his entire career.

Throughout the years, Williams stated his goal was to have people point to him and remark, "There goes Ted Williams, the greatest hitter who ever lived." (1941)

Farm plows uncover ancient **Americans**

Thirteen thousand years ago, most of Michigan was covered in a wall of ice up to a mile high. Archaeologists believed this kept some of the continent's earliest people, a group called Clovis after their distinctive spear points, from

settling in the region.

But an independent

researcher along with University of Michigan researchers have identified a 13,000-year-old Clovis camp site, now thought to be the earliest archaeological site in America. The site predates previously identified human settlements in the Michigan basin and potentially rewrites the history of the peopling~-or settling-of the Great Lakes region.

The site was likely occupied by a small group of people, about six or seven, who briefly lived on a river in southwest Michigan toward the end of the Pleistocene. The finding also suggests this is the northwesternmost Clovis settlement in the Great Lakes region. The researchers describe their findings in a paper published in the journal PaleoAmerica.

The Clovis people were a Paleoindian culture who lived in the Americas. The culture quickly spread through North and South America. Most Native Americans today can trace their ancestry to these early in-

habitants, according to Brendan Nash, a doctoral student and an author of the paper.

In the paleo-archaeology world, Clovis technology can be easily identified by two characteristics of their tools: that they primarily used a high quality stone called chert and that they used a distinct method of making these

Previously, there was little evidence that Clovis settled in Michigan. The region was nearly uninhabitable at this time: Much of the state, except a triangular swath over southwest Michigan that extended toward the tip of the mitt, was covered by glaciers.

"As the glaciers were retreating, they created a predictable ice-front environment that was frequented by early humans favorite prey," Nash said. "Early humans had a wolf model of subsistence: They traveled around in large groups and didn't stay in any place too long. They were an apex predator and probably doing both hunting and scavenging, perhaps by running other ice age predators such as saber-toothed tigers and shortfaced bears off their prey. What we have at the Belson site appears to be a short-term camp by a group that would likely split off from the main group seasonally."







There is no argument that applies to this, except to note that while searching the lists of sports trading cards I stumbled across one Sherwood Robert "Sherry"

Magee (1884-1929) was a premier left fielder in the "Dead Ball ERA"-1905-1914; he hit over .300 five times, with a batting title and was a .291 career hitter who played for six teams.


Sherry delivered many great hits during his career but none more famous than the right cross he delivered to the chin of umpire Bill Finneran that sent the arbiter into unconsciousness. Magee was suspended for the remainder of the season but on appeal the ban was shortened to 36 days

And his baseball card is valued at \$680,204, a princely amount that seems commensurate with his claim to fame.

Which got me to thinking: What interesting baseball cards might be lurking about in the mysterious realm of sports ""trading" cards. Id never heard of Sherwood Robert Sherry" Magee but since he clocked an umpire and has a hefty price tag on his baseball card, I doubt I'll forget him.

You'd think the pricing of baseball cards would be somewhat capricious; they're old and scarce and they've been evaluated by Professional Sports Authenticator or Beckett Grading Services or Sports and Guaranty~ three of the most respected card appraisers operating today.

Here are some of the top cards extant, beginning with THE most famous, rare and expensive of them all: 1. Honus Wagner, 1909-1911, \$6,600. Only 23 cards were made so they do not turn up often; 2. Mickey Mantle 1952, Tbpps;~~-\$5.2 million; 3. Lebron James, Upper Deck Exquisite Collection, \$5.2 million-and it's rumored that King James controls every aspect of the card's creation including any extras-uniform



swatch, autograph, personalized messages -all of such customizing elevating the purchase price; 4. Luka Doncic, Panini National Treasures, 2018, \$4.6 million; 5. Mike Trout, Bowman Chrome Draft Prospects, 2009, \$3.9 million; 6. Tom Brady, Playoff Con-Championship tenders Rookie, 2000, \$2.6 million; 7. Giannis Antetokaunmpo, Panini National Treasures, \$1.9 million; 8. Kobe Bryant, Topps Chrome Refractions Rookie Card, 1996-1997, \$1.8 million; 9. Michael Jorden, Upper Deck Game Jersey, 1997, \$1.4 million and 10. Wayne Gretzky, O-Pee-Chee, 1979, \$1.3 million.

That is the wild Top 10 of a group of appraisers and the value is what keeps card collectors buying the things, that and the fact that it's an enjoyable hobby

My oldest son Christopher was an avid collector and he acquired a Hank Aaron rookie in excellent condition that was valued at a hefty amount that surprised both of us. It is now with him in Singapore where he works.

In the realm of card collecting you never know what you might unearth from a stack of used, or even new, cards.

Chris collects sports cards, professional musician son Arlyn collects guitars and me? I collected "Astounding Science Fiction" magazines, building a complete collection of the years from 1937 to the present [which was 1979, when I stopped collecting them]

I had read each issue, maintained them in perfect condition and sold the collection to a dealer who made me an offer I couldn't refuse. And he would have the issues available for other science fiction aficionados to enjoy as I had. 

Another Lions victory

Varsity Lions win again, beat Vacaville Christian 46-30

Change is the watchword in these COVID-mangled times but from the chaos rises coherence for the Lions as they arranged a last-minute replacement game with Vacaville Christian and the Falcons came to Lion Stadium only to be engaged in a score fest eventually won by the varsity Lions 46.30.

"We knew this could be a tough game because Vacaville Christian came here with a 4-0 record, "I said Linden head coach Chris Herrera. "It was a schedule shift that wasn't decided until Wednesday night." The game was scheduled to be the last game of the regular season for both teams and was moved to the spot vacated by Rio Vista due to various prob-

Herrera said a few key players were lost due to injuries and other reasons and "our starting middle linebacker was lost to injury five plays into the game so we had to shift people around and adjust."

This win brought Linden's Sierra Delta League record to

3-0 with two of the wins by forfeit—Golden Sierra and Rio Vista—which puts Linden in a "good spot to run the table. Our kids are more resilient, patient and understanding of where we are and what we need to do the rest of the way," said Herrera.

Vacaville Christian took an 8-7 lead into the second quarter and the Lions put 17 second quarter points on the scoreboard while an often dominant defense continually stuffed the Falcons running game and held the visitors to eight second quarter points. Linden had a 24-16 halftime

The adjustments Herrera said they'd made throughout the year continued in the second half when, in the third quarter, the Lions put up six points to lead 3b-16 to seemingly lock up the game.

The Falcons had other ideas and parlayed an interception runback and another touchdown into a 30-30 tie by the end of third stanza.

"Our defense really put a lot of pressure on them," Herrera said. "in the game we had three picks and recovered a couple of fumbles. More importantly, Vacaville Christian likes to run and we stopped them." He said when Linden was up 30-16 and "they tied it in the third quarter we were down but in the fourth quarter we marched over them to a score. We're very balanced. We lift in the morning and condition every day after practice. And we wore them down.))

The crucial play and moment came with four minutes left in the contest and Linden at their own 30 facing a third and nine. Quarterback Alex Herrera threw a long pass to Jordan Sherman who grabbed it and raced into the end zone to complete the 70 yard scoring play that clinched it for the Lions, 46-30.

"It wasn't our cleanest game but we played with a lot of heart," Coach Herrera said. "We've been building toughness throughout the year and our conditioning is excellent. Every team we've played has cramped up but we haven't, not once.

Here are the stats: Passing: Alex Herrera completed 8 of 22 for 258 yards, three touchdowns, a longest of 70 yards and a quarterback rating of 101.9.

Rushing: Joe Cowan lugged the pigskin 23 times for 101 yards, a 4.4 average, a long run of 24 yards and two touchdowns.

Herrera had 11 carries for 71 yards with a 6.5 average.

Receiving: Jordan Sherman caught six passes for 203 yards, a 33.8 yard average, a longest of 70 yards and two touchdowns. Michael Cook caught two for 55 yards, a longest of 53 yards and a touch-

Tackles: Myles Flint-1 2, Dominic Dias and Carlos Figuerora-each with 10, Alejandro Perez-9, Jeremiah Brintley-6. Lions contributing to the team's 78 tackles were Lucas Davis, Jacob Lanticse, Christian Friis, Cole Nixon, Tony Cowan, Andrew Kafton, Anthony Ortega and Jack McCann. Row & vegetable crops: Whiteflies are more prevalent in melon crops. Fall veggies (cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower, etc.) are in the ground and growing nicely. Tomatoes: Ethephon continues to be applied to fields that are not maturing fast enough.

Ancient Americans

Thomas Talbot, a self-taught researcher, found the first Clovis spear point in 2008 in the fields of a farm in early spring. He often walks the fields at this time of year, after the fields have been plowed, searching for Native American spear points.

He said there was no mistaking the point's origin: It was made of a kind of chert preferred by Clovis in this region, and made using the same technological method so distinct to the Clovis people. The stone, called Attica chert, is found in one region in western Indiana and eastern Illinois, 120 miles away from the Belson site.

"Paleolithic pieces-not quite this old, but pieces that are similar-have turned up around Michigan, but usually they are pretty scattered, like maybe someone lost it while they were hunting or walking through," Talbot said. "So although I thought it was really cool, I thought it was a once-in-a-lifetime finding. But other pieces started turning up, and by the end of the spring, it was pretty clear that I had Clovis components at this site."

Clovis tools such as projectile points and hide scrapers have a very characteristic central channel through the length of the tool, called a flute. A Clovis person would have chipped stone outward from this central channel to create a place to attach the projectile point to its spear shaft. Also distinctive to the Clovis people is that they struck large flakes of material off the stone to create their points. The large, detached pieces had razor-sharp edges and would be used as expedient knives themselves.

Talbot found about nine pieces from the Clovis including two pieces of the same spearpoint he found years apart. In 2019, Talbot met Henry Wright, an anthropologist and archaeologist, to show him the collection. Wright confirmed Talbot's suspicions. The following summer, in 2020, researchers led by Nash began the dig at Talbot's site, now called the Belson Site after the family of farmers who own the land.

The Belson site is similar in size to other Paleoindian camping sites. About 1.5 meters beneath the ground's surface, the researchers found an intact horizon indicating the campsite. They also found more tools as well as flakes of material that indicate the camp's inhabitants were making tools on site.

"Last year, with Brendan's expertise and Henry's guidance, we opened up the site and found two distinct artifacts well below the plow zone, which means they're undisturbed. They've laid there for 13,000 years," Talbot said. "That tells us we have at least a partially undisturbed Clovis component in Michigan, and that's huge. That's very big news that changes archaeology for the state of Michigan."

To date, the researchers have found more than 20 tools and hundreds of pieces of manufacturing and refurbishment debris.

Nash says there is a caveat to their findings. The Belson projectile points are similar to another set of early projectile points called Gainey, which also have a flute running up the center of the spearpoint, But the Belson projectile points exhibit the large flaking characteristic of Clovis technology, whereas Gainey points are shaped by many strikes that take off smaller flakes of material.

"The peopling process of the Great Lakes was always thought to have been later, and that the Great Lakes was really just the northernmost region of a bunch of other group's ranges," Nash said. "Michigan culture history has always been thought to be piecemeal of other place's culture histories that happen to be coming into and out of Michigan periodically.

"Now what we're seeing is that we've got a presence that is as early as other sites in North America, and it has the same technology. Now we can not only move Great Lakes culture history back a little bit, but we can also say, 'Maybe it has its own story that's not just the butt end of the story of every other region. There might be something really




unique."

A laboratory in Colorado will conduct a protein residue analysis that may be able to identify which animals or plants the spear points may have been used on, which could tell the researchers what prey the people were hunting, Nash says.
