### Wayward cat grounds jet

Feb. 11 (UPI) — A Ryanair flight bound for Germany was grounded for two days in Rome after a stowaway cat was found to have climbed into the plane's electrical bay.



The Boeing 737 had been scheduled to take passengers to Germany last week, but the flight was delayed when crew members heard meowing coming from the plane's inner workings.

Engineers discovered the cat was in the vehicle's electrical bay, and their attempts to reach the feline only caused it to flee further into the mechanism.

The plane grounded, with engineers raising fears that the cat could cause potentially catastrophic damage while in the air. A door was left open and the cat finally exited the plane on its own after about two days on the tarmac.

The plane finally departed for Germany on Monday.

## Picking up chopsticks part of CHP work

Feb. 10 (UPI) — California Highway Patrol officers were left playing "a giant game of pick-up sticks" when a truck spilled its load of chopsticks onto the highway. The CHP's Hayward station said on social media that officers responded to a report of a traffic hazard on Interstate 580, near the Redwood Road exit, and arrived to find the "sticky situation."



"What happened?" his Mother asked.



# **San Joaquin Supervisors** want to eliminate same-day voter registration

San Joaquin County Board of Supervisors Advocates

Voter ID Requirements and Elimination of Same-Day Registration

The San Joaquin County Board of Supervisors recently approved letters to state and federal leaders urging changes to election laws to require voter identification for all elections and eliminate same-day voter registration. These measures aim to enhance election integrity, control costs, and bolster public confidence in the electoral process.

"We consistently hear from our constituents on this issue and recognize the importance of bolstering voter confidence in our elections," said Board Chair Paul Canepa. "The Election Advisory Committee's efforts played a key role in guiding this Board to its decision."

Thirty-six states have laws that request or require voters to present identification at the polls. Additionally, more than half of U.S. states do not allow same-day voter registration. While same-day registration was originally implemented to increase voter accessibility, it has presented administrative challenges and contributed to delays in election certification.

California law allows people to register and vote with a provisional ballot up to 14 days before an election, including Election Day. However, processing provisional ballots requires additional staff time, resources, and costs, as each ballot must be verified before it is counted. Both the California Secretary of State and the San Joaquin County Registrar of Voters websites say the registration deadline is 14 days before the election. This discrepancy needs to be fixed to make the rules clear, consistent, and more efficient.

District Four Supervisor Steve Ding, who led the effort by bringing this item to the Board, emphasized, "Requiring ID to vote is simply common sense—it's needed for everyday tasks, so why not for something as important as voting? Same-day registration only adds confusion and costs more to verify voters. Enforcing registration deadlines helps save taxpayer

On January 9 the San Joaquin County Election Advisory Committee (EAC) unanimously approved a recommendation supporting these election law changes. The Board of Supervisors reviewed the EAC's recommendation 10 days later and requested the opportunity to review draft letters before finalizing its

The San Joaquin County Board of Supervisors is advocating for these reforms to promote transparency and public confidence in the election process.

# Storms fill state reservoirs

As a result of significant Shasta Dam. storms in early February, which resulted in high runoff inflows into Northern California reservoirs, the federal Bureau of Reclamation (BOR) is implementing flood control operations at the Shasta Reservoir. Those operations include doubling water releases from the reservoir, beginning Friday, February 7.

The actions are being undertaken with close coordination between Federal, State and local agencies, according to a press release from Mary Lee Knecht, a spokesperson for the BOR. The BOR coordinates its flood management operations in order to maximize hydropower created by releases from Central Valley Project facilities, including

"Federal pumps in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Bay-Delta are currently operating at maximum capacity and storing water in San Luis Reservoir to support south-of-Delta delivery to farms, communities, and wildlife refuges when needed later this year," according to a press release from the BOR on February


Releases from the Shasta Reservoir will be double from the current rate of 30,000 cubic feet per second to 60,000 cfs, beginning Friday, February 7. The releases will be implemented over the day on Friday, increasing to 40,000 csf by 2 pm, and reaching a full 60,000 by 10 pm.

Keswick Dam, which is located not far downstream from Shasta Dam, will help regulate the flow of the releases from the Shasta Reservoir, which are expected to last at least through the weekend and could be adjusted next week as needed.

Similarly, on the Trinity River, the BOR said, Lewiston Dam releases will increase from 1,500 cfs to 3,500 cfs on Friday. Whiskeytown Dam releases, which are currently at 300 cfs, will remain in place.

Since January 31, the Shasta Reservoir has risen by more than 22 feet, the BOR says. A coordinated team that includes local and state agencies as well as the United States Army Corps of Engineers is working together to implement the water releases.



# **Tribute to former Linden resident**

POPLAR BLUFF, MISSOURI—

#### A Life Remembered: My Father, Sergio Garduño

Tonight, my blood father, Sergio Garduño, passed away—across a country, yet shattering my heart as if he were right beside me. Born in Mexico, he came to California through the hard work of my grandfather during the war, when the United States launched the Bracero Program, offering legal immigrants a chance at a better life in the fields. He was a man of many identities, yet to me, he was simply my father—his only child, his legacy.

Sergio grew up in Linden, a small Italian farming community where everyone knew his name. To some, he was a fighter in high school, a young man with fire in his heart. To others, he was a respected manager in the walnut and cherry orchards, leading laborers with skill and grit.

There were those who knew him for his darker, more clandestine pursuits, and others who saw him behind the wheel of a forklift at the big red barn in town. Some remember the days he owned a baseball card shop, while others recall the treehouses and koi ponds he built with his hands. But no matter what chapter of his life they knew him from, the old Italian farmers loved my father—for his respect, his work ethic, and the infectious smile I inherited from him.

For years, I believed I was simply half-Mexican, only to later discover, through DNA tests, that we were Spanishspeaking Natives.

Yet identity, like life itself, is fluid—something my father understood well. He was a man forever searching for his place in this world, like so many of us.

I will never forget the memories we created—the hikes through the wilderness, the nights spent camping under the stars, the thrill of exploring caves and searching for lost treasures in abandoned mining camps. He taught me to value history, to collect old coins, stamps, and relics from the past. But I will also remember the painful times, when schizophrenia took hold of his mind, leading him to cover his walls with lifelike faces drawn in a frenzy of confusion. I inherited his artistic gift, his ability to bring images to life, just as I inherited his resilience.

nor a sinner—he simply was a man, flawed and lost at times, but never lacking in heart. I remember the burritos he sent me at school through my aunt, the late-night runs to Food 4 Less for fresh French bread and Mexican cheese, the simple joys of sharing a meal together. He taught me to stand tall, to fight back when necessary. I once watched him take on three men at a gas sta-

tion—half his age—and win. To some, he was a demon. To me, he was my dad.

She taught me to be humble, to be compassionate, even to those who would try to break me. And as Time and distance created a I sit here, shaking, crying, I know that my dad is no longer lost or suffering. He is free—

He listened, never judged, just sat with me in that moment, as only a father could. Then, he made me one final meal-eggs, bacon,

I owe a special thanks to my helped him find God in the end. On my last visit, he spoke of the Bible, of his happiness, of watching Fox News and seeing Donald Trump—a man born in Mexico who loved Trump. A paradox that some might find amusing, but one that only proves the complexity of life and identity.

Life is too short for hatred. My father's journey reminds me that we should be proud of this nation, of its foundations built on faith, hard work, and the relentless pursuit of something greater. We are here, if only for a moment, to carve our names into the annals of history before we, too, journey to the stars.

before the season opened at 7 a.m.," Herzig tells Outdoor Life. "It was pretty tight inside the shanty with three of us, and all our spearing gear and clothing. But when legal spearing began, we were ready."

Herzig says Charlie and Ben are experienced Winnebago spearfishermen. They had scouted the area well before the opener, drilling test holes through the 18-inch-thick lake ice and dropping sonar devices to check for hot spots.

"They found a good place in 13 feet of water before the season," says Herzig. "So right there we cut a 2-foot by 4foot large hole in the ice with a chainsaw, because you need a big opening for spearing. Then the shanty was pulled over the hole, and we were all set for opening day."

As part of their preparation, Herzig says they used separate lines to lower an underwater camera and a LiveScope transducer to the bottom of the lake. The group also hung a white coffee mug from a third line to act as a decoy and draw sturgeon in.

"Winnebago is off color this year, so we really needed the camera and sonar to let us know when a sturgeon passed under the shanty," explains Herzig, a nursing student from Fond du Lac. "The sonar was most helpful, and with experience it's easy to tell what a sturgeon looks like on a sonar screen compared to a big pike or other fish."

At 7:05 a.m. that morning, just five minutes into the spearing season, Ben spotted a large sturgeon as it passed under their shanty.

Herzig's boyfriend, Charlie Loehr (left), helped her land the fish by throwing a second spear into the giant stur-

"I couldn't see the fish but we knew it was there, so I threw my 5-prong spear straight down and barbed it in the tail," Herzig says. "It was a lucky shot."

With the spear in the fish's tail, it pulled hard against the rope. The three anglers battled the big sturgeon for about 10 minutes and finally pulled it near the hole. They only saw the fish for a moment, but it was enough time for Charlie to throw a single-prong spear into the middle.

"It put up real fight, against two harpoons with heavy ropes attached," Herzig said. "It fought us for another 10 minutes, then finally tired and we pulled it to the ice hole. That was a little scary – with the big flopping fish, all our gear inside the shanty, wearing heavy clothing, and all of us struggling to get it out of the water and not fall in."

They called their friend Justin Kraus, who was nearby in another shanty. With Kraus' help, they managed to lift the fish out of the hole and onto the ice. Loading the giant sturgeon into the truck bed was a challenge, too, says

After spending the rest of their morning in the shanty, they took the fish to be weighed, as required by the DNR, before 1 p.m. They went to the official weigh station at Wendt's on the Lake, a lakeshore restaurant that also serves as a gathering place during spearing season.

After confirming Herzig's fish as a female lake sturgeon, DNR personnel recorded a weight of 180.5 pounds, with a 79.3-inch length. While short of the Winnebago Lake sturgeon record of 212.2 pounds, Herzig's fish is still a giant for the well-known fishery.

Herzig's fish weighed more than 180 pounds and measured 79.3 inches in length, which means it was longer than she is tall.

"They told me it's the fourth largest sturgeon taken in the Winnebago watershed. I've been doing this for five years, mostly with my dad who's been spearing sturgeon for 15 years. But this is my first one I've ever gotten."

Anglers can buy a Winnebago sturgeon spearing license well in advance of the season, with each angler allowed only one fish. The season lasts for 16 days or until a specific harvest cap is reached, and the Wisconsin DNR says 290 sturgeon were speared during opening weekend with Herzig's being the largest. There were also more than 3,000 ice shanties out on the lake over the weekend, according to the agency.

Herzig says they'll filet her big lake sturgeon, and then either smoke the meat or cut it into pieces for frying. She says the meat is great eating. And although her spearing season is over for the year, she's already planning to go back out with Charlie, Ben, and her dad, all of whom still have licenses. "It's been really exciting," she says. "I was so lucky to get my sturgeon, and I'd love to do it again and help the others get one."



In fact the national power grid is in such a weakened state that frequent island-wide power outages may be expected if there is a disturbance even in one of our lines," a source familiar with the country's utility system told Sri Lanka's Daily Mirror newspaper.

Feb. 10 (UPI) — Serial Guinness World Recordbreaker David Rush took his juggling skills — and his snacking prowess — to the extreme by taking 198 bites out of three apples while juggling the fruits for one minute. > Shukla, nicknamed the "Human Calculator" by Guinness World Records, said he practices math for five to six hours a day to keep his mind sharp for competitions.



> She said her son took some fresh-made peanut butter balls outside to cool and discovered an opossum was curled up on the outdoor sectional, which was covered in chocolate paw prints.

"The cake had been knocked off the table and was sitting on the floor in front of where she was," Doggett told the Omaha World-Herald. "The most gone."

The opossum was not moving, and appeared to be pant-

"The opossum looked a little distressed," she said. "We thought we better call the Humane Society and get this guy checked out."

Doggett said she couldn't find any information online on whether chocolate is dangerous to opossums, but she knew the treat was toxic to dogs, so she figured it was better to be safe than sorry.

A Nebraska Humane Society animal control officer took the opossum to Nebraska Wildlife Rehab, which posted a photo of the animal to social media along with an intake note reading: "Opossum was brought in due to having eaten an entire Costco chocolate cake."

"Everybody was posting that this was their spirit animal," Doggett said.

Veterinarians treated the opossum with activated charcoal to neutralize any potential toxicity from the chocolate. She was also found to have a high level of lead, likely from eating local insects.

The opossum is now being treated for the lead in her system and will be released in a few weeks, rehab officials said. "With some time in rehab (and a diet reset), this choco-holic should be stabilized enough to return to the wild but until then, she is definitely a little cranky about our strict 'zero chocolate' policy," the rehab said on social media.
