#### After more than 40 years, grad ring is found

Feb. 25 (UPI) — A Missouri man tending to his garden found a high school class ring from Nebraska that turned out to have been missing since around 1981.

Neal Lansdown said he was working in his garden near Rock Port when he spotted something glistening in the dirt.

He cleaned the object and discovered it was an Omaha Northwest High School Class of 1978 ring, with the name Cary Crocker inscribed on the inside.

Lansdown said he was fascinated by how the ring came to be in his garden, about 70 miles south of Omaha.

"I don't want a reward, I just want the satisfaction of knowing where he lost it and giving him the ring back," Lansdown told WOWT-TV.

The Omaha Northwest Foundation sparked a search for Crocker on social media, but the efforts of online sleuths failed to turn up any solid leads until Crocker spotted his ring on a TV news report.

Crocker, who now lives in Florida, said he believes the ring went missing around 1981.

"I have no clue how it got away from me," he said. "Whether I lost it or misplaced it or someone stole it, I don't know."

Crocker said he has never been to Rock Port, but his family did run an Omaha flower shop around the time he lost the ring, so it might have ended up in soil that eventually made its way to Lansdown's garden. "We sold potted plants and all that for many years and I'd be down there from time to time to work, so I don't know, that could be a possibility," he said.

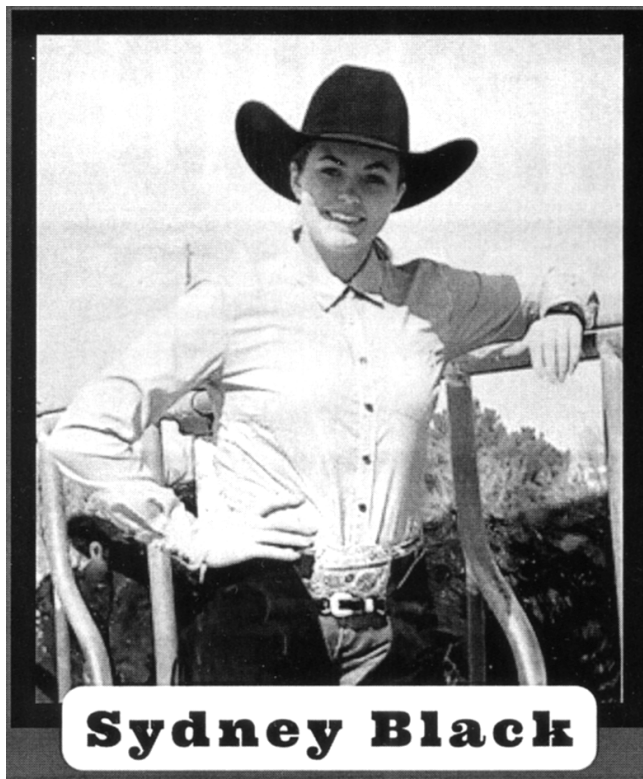

### San Joaquin County ...

## Founded 175 years ago in old California

On February 18, 1850, San Joaquin County became one of the first 27 counties created by an official act of the newly-formed California Legislature.

In 1848, the region that would become the state of California was ceded to the United States as a provision of the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo which ended the Mexican-American War.

The U.S. government had failed to provide detailed guidance as to how the newly-acquired land should be governed and soon, local leaders took matters into their own hands. In June of 1849, General Bennet Riley, acting as California's civil governor, called for the election of delegates to attend a constitutional convention later that year in

Monterey. Representatives from the districts of Los Angeles, Monterey, Sacramento, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, San Jose, and Sonoma drafted and accepted the first constitution of California in preparation for its statehood the following year.

Among other things, the Constitution of 1849 established the offices of Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and a two-house legislature. One of the first acts of the new legislature was the reorganization of the territory and the creation of civil governments to aid in effective administration of the new state. The aptly-titled "[An] Act subdividing the State into Counties, and establishing the Seats of Justice therein"

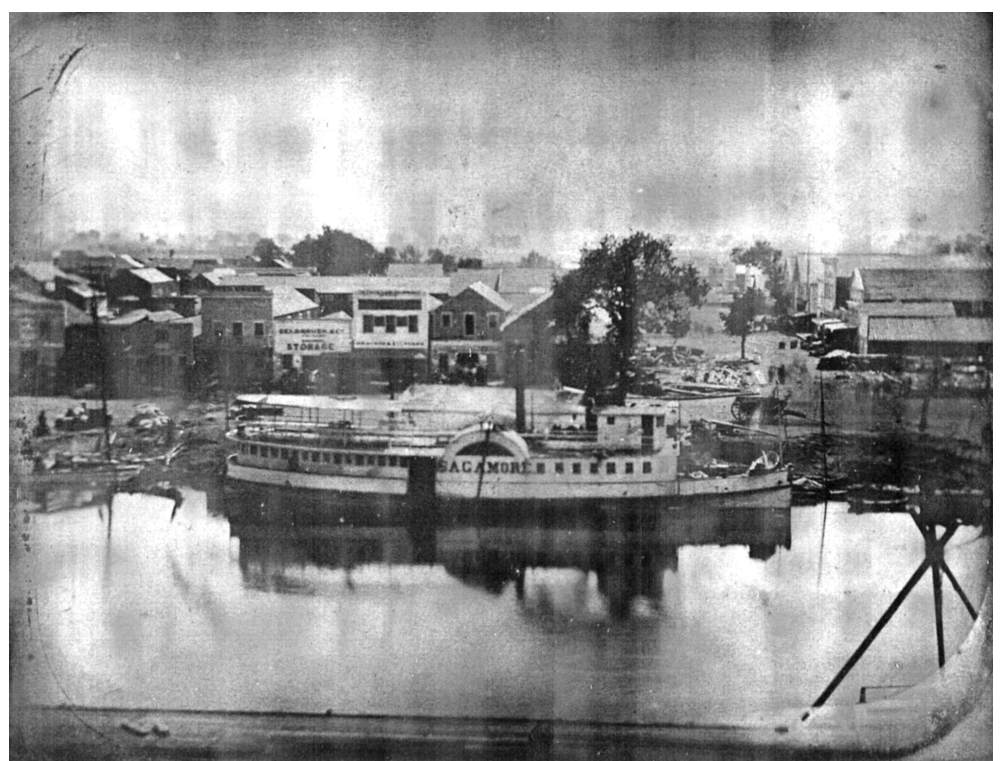
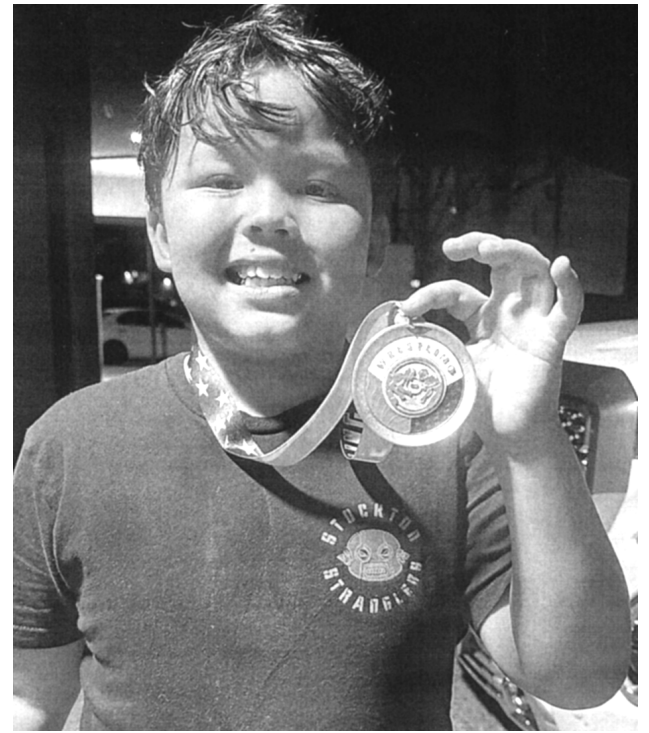

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# Supes put halt to pot and smoke shops in county

The San Joaquin County Board of Supervisors directed staff to draft an urgency ordinance imposing a moratorium on new smoke shops in unincorporated areas of the county. Staff will also develop stronger regulations and increased oversight to address concerns over the sale of illegal and unregulated products at these businesses.

"In communities like the ones I represent, we're seeing multiple smoke shops opening in a small area," said Board Chair Paul Canepa. "We need to work with our city partners to ensure our regulations align and don't allow prohibited activities to thrive in unincorporated county pockets. Schools, parks, and children should all be considered when these licenses are issued."

The Board directed county departments—including the Sheriff's Office, District Attorney's Office, Community Development, Code Enforcement, and Public Health Services—to propose updates to business and development regulations. Staff will also explore a tobacco retail licensing process for long-term oversight or potentially banning the sale of THC and hemp products to prevent illicit drug sales to local youth.

"We have seen evidence of illegal activities at these smoke shops, which pose a threat to our children and communities," said District Five Supervisor Robert Rickman. "An emergency moratorium will allow us to put stronger regulations in place, ensuring these businesses operate responsibly and don't contribute to public safety concerns."

The urgency ordinance and moratorium will be presented for final consideration at the next Board of Supervisors meeting on March 11 at 9:00 AM in the County Administration Building in Stockton.

# Garcia considers Delta run

Linden's former representative on the Delta College Board of Trustees, 84-year-old Kathy Garcia, is considering a run for the Delta College Board of Directors next year.

Garcia was forced to step down in March 2024—and a hand-picked successor, Dr. Armondo Valerio, was selected in a questionable maneuver by the college board.

The State Attorney General ruled that Garcia could not serve on the Delta Board as well as her long-term seat on the local Eastside Fire District at the same time.

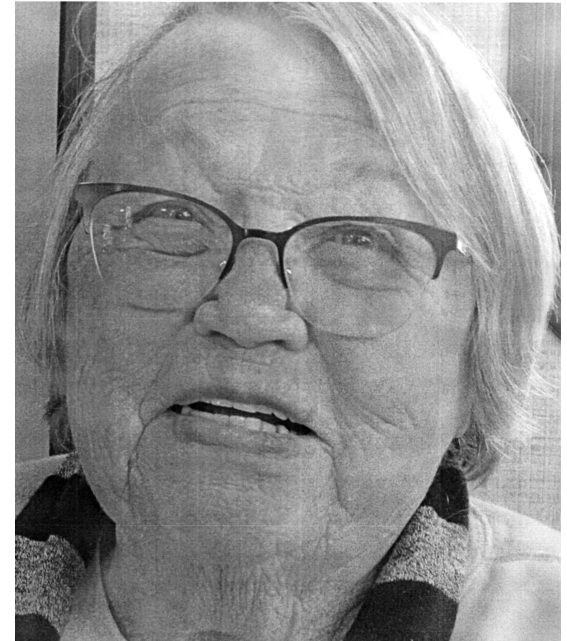
The AG's reasoning was somewhat vague and odd with the word "allegedly" in the report. Garcia decided not to fight the matter and quit Delta and the fire boards.

But she may return. The maneuver was questionable because Garcia was barred from the Delta College Board's closed-door meeting to discuss her case.

State law allows closed-door meetings only for personnel matters with specific charges or complaints. Garcia was an elected board member and not an employee.

Garcia told the Linden Herald that she is considering suing the Delta Board and the Stockton Record because of

false information. The newspaper published a front page article which, Garcia says, was slanderous. Adding to the slander was the fact the newspaper did not contact her for Garcia's side of story, rather publishing a one-sided press release Delta issued, which unfortunately is the typical policy of Gannett, which owns the Record and their inept reporters. 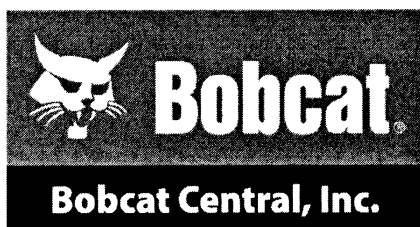

## Flora's safeguard proposal

In response to growing concerns about patient access to anesthesia services in California, particularly in the Central Valley, Assemblymember Heath Flora (R-Ripon who represents Linden) recently introduced two bills that aim to safeguard Californians' access to critical anesthesia care. California's Anesthesia Access Package consists of AB 876 and AB 1215 to clarify existing statutes and protect access to quality and timely anesthesia services.

Regulatory confusions and misinterpretations have not only threatened the availability of essential anesthesia services in California, but also risked patient safety," said Assemblymember Flora. "These two bills provide much-needed clarity to address workforce challenges, rebuild trust in our health care delivery system, and ensure quality care without disruption."

Damaging allegations about care provided by Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists / Anesthesiologists (CRNAs) led to significant – and unnecessary – disruptions in California. Last year, the lack of oversight and clear guidelines regarding anesthesia care forced a hospital within Flora's district to cancel more than 1,000 surgeries, disproportionately impacting Medi-Cal and Medicare beneficiaries. California must ensure its regulatory practices support all health care providers and facilities in delivering safe, high-quality care.

"We're grateful to Assemblymember Flora for his efforts to stand up for patients, improve health outcomes, and maintain provider accountability," said Emily Francke, CRNA, President of the California Association of Nurse Anesthesiology (CANA). "Together, we're committed to protecting and – more importantly –

increasing access to high-quality, safe, and timely anesthesia care for Californians throughout the state."

Together, AB 876 and AB 1215, will amend the Nurse Anesthetist Act (Article 7, Subsections 2825-2833.6) and California Code Regulations Title 22 to establish clear guidelines regarding anesthesia services, ensure California health care facilities include CRNAs' expertise in governance and decision-making, promote patient-centered policies, and improve access to quality anesthesia care, particularly in rural and underserved regions of the state.

California's Anesthesia Access Package will align state law with common practice and federal laws governing CRNAs to ensure qualified anesthesia providers can continue to deliver quality care and support the evolving needs of California's diverse population.

## Cops arrest murder suspect

On November 18, 2024, at approximately 6:44 p.m., Officers responded to the area of N California St/E Park St on a report of a shooting. When Officers arrived on scene they located the two male victims, 18 and 30, who had been struck by gunfire. They were transported to an area hospital. The 18-year-old was treated for a non-life-threatening injury and released from the hospital. Unfortunately, the 30-year-old

victim was pronounced deceased as a result of his injuries. Detectives were notified and responded to take over the investigation. November 26, 2024 Arrest Update:

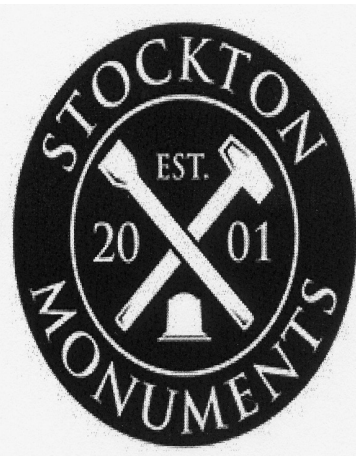
Detectives have continued to work on this homicide since it occurred. De'Arius Wilson, 22, was identified as a suspect in the case. On November 26, Officers were able to locate Wilson with the assistance of the US Marshal Task Force. Wilson was taken into custody and booked into the San Joaquin County Jail on homicide-related charges.

February 22, 2025 Arrest update: Detectives have continued to conduct follow up on this homicide case since it occurred. A second suspect was identified in the case as, De'Andre Watts, 23. On February 22, 2025, members from the US Marshals Task Force arrested Watts, in north Stockton, without incident. Watts

was booked into the San Joaquin County Jail for homicide.

The investigation is ongoing.

Recently the Valley Lode District Garden Club had a very interesting and educational meeting at the Mickey Grove Zoo in Lodi. The Lodi Garden Club sponsored the event. They arrange to have two guest speakers, one by the name of Stuart Spenser and Janice Vaughn. They are very much involved with the wine industry. They have 750 farmer members and a total of 90,000 acres of vineyards in Lodi. What makes these farmers plant 130 varieties of winegrapes varieties? The soil is so diverse. Lodi is the largest grape growing area in California, with some vineyards 140 years old.

Lodi grapes are shipped all over the world. Now, farmers from other countries are shipping wine to America.

## Tight lines ...

BURSON – While known best for its bass fishing, the Mother Lode's Lake Camanche, is a quality rainbow trout fishery targeted by shore and boat anglers throughout the year.

The early summer and late fall, especially at a time of record fires and record heat, is generally not the top time to target trout at Camanche, but Robbie Dunham of Koke Machine Guide Service decided to try the lake anyway.

On Friday, Sept. 4, Dunham and Dianne Stockton found surprisingly good trout fishing on a scout trip to Lake Camanche, a popular EBMUD reservoir.

"We launched out of the North Shore Marina as I always do," he said. "I told her it might be a boat ride or we might catch some fish. I had no expectations that we would do as well as we did."

The two anglers caught a total of 10 rainbows, each taking home their five fish limit, by noon. The largest fish weighed 4 lbs., while the majority were in the 2 lb. range.

"We caught the fish all over the lake from the North Shore Marine to the dam — we covered a lot of ground. We used Speedy Shiners around 40 feet deep to catch the fish," Dunham said.

Lake Camanche, located on the Mokelumne River in the low, rolling Sierra Nevada foothills northeast of Linden, features good shore and bank fishing for trout during the fall, winter and spring months, but it can be fickle at times.

"You can go fishing all morning on the lake and leave at noon without a bite," said Bob Simms, host of the KFBK Outdoor Show. "Then the anglers in the boat that arrives at the ramp at noon will catch their limits by 2:30 pm."

As the weather cools and fall trout plants begin, trout fishing should shift into high gear at Camanche.

Since regular rainbow trout plants began in 1989, the

East Bay Municipal Utility District water supply reservoir, has become known throughout the north state as an outstanding trout fishery.

Each year, over 60,000 pounds of trout are stocked between October and June. The fish weigh at least a pound and go up to trophy sized 8 pounders, according to the Lake

result of a flatboat ferry crossing across the Mokelumne River. Founded by Mexican settlers in 1848, it was situated on the north bank of the Mokelumne River, 9 miles south-southeast of Lodi at an elevation of 220 feet. Lancha Plana Bridge crosses the lake now about where the town once stood.

Other towns inundated by the lake rising waters include Ar-



Camanche Recreation Company.

Ten percent of the fish stocked in the lake and pond are trophy fish three pounds and over, including some real lunkers. The concessionaire plants only "triploid" fish — infertile fish incapable of spawning — since EBMUD biologists don't want the rainbows mixing with the native run of steelhead in the Mokelumne River below Camanche dam.

The largest trout I have ever personally caught at Camanche was a 7-1/2 pounder that I landed while trolling in April over a decade ago, but many huge fish have been caught on this lake.

You could catch the trout of a lifetime when you fish at Lake Camanche. Just ask Mark and Mike Seaters of Lodi, who teamed up to catch the lake record rainbow of 19.42 pounds while fishing a brown plastic worm near the dam on May 5, 1998. Ray Miles of Woodbridge set the record for the South Trout Pond when he bagged a 19.37 lb. largemouth while fishing a jig on March 28, 1998.

While many anglers come to the lake to fish from shore or boat, very few are

aware of the lake's history. After the dam was completed and the reservoir filled in 1964, the remains of several Gold Rush towns were flooded.

The most notable of these was Lancha Plana — "flat boat" in Spanish — a settlement in Amador County formed as a

kansas Ferry, China Gulch, and of course, Camanche, the town that the reservoir is named after. The town, formerly called Limerick, became Camanche, named after Camanche, Iowa, in 1849.

Each pound equals to roughly 170 fingerlings; the math is about 800,000 baby bass fish. They planted the bass in multiple locations throughout the entire shoreline of the lake.

Beside rainbow trout and black bass, abundant populations of channel catfish, black crappie, bluegill and sunfish are found in abundance in the lake.

Steve Anderson set the lake crappie record on March 1, 2016 when he landed a 3.16 lb. crappie while fishing a jig. Jeff Howard set the lake catfish record on December 3, 2016 when he landed a 27.6 lb. channel cat while soaking chicken liver in the Narrows.

While fishing for any of these



species, you may see the iconic bald eagles that migrate south to Camanche every year.

Alan Ivory, a doctoral student and lead author of the research published in the journal *Urban Naturalist*, said he and his team set up 39 cameras in 33 stormwater sewers in Gainesville in an attempt to document the use of the underground tunnels by wildlife over a period of 60 days.

The researchers ended up with 3,800 sightings of 35 animal species, including 50 alligator sightings.

"It's like something out of *Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles*," Ivory told *The New York Times*. "The abundance of animals down there was surprising."

Ivory said the gators mostly seemed to be using the sewers as passageways between ponds, but some appeared to be using the tunnels to hunt for fish.

"It's almost as if they were cornering the fish into this dead end, using the human infrastructure to help them forage," Ivory said.

The research team said they also documented about 1,800 raccoon sightings — and the animals would sometimes walk off with the cameras.

"We would have raccoons steal cameras every now and then," Ivory said. "They would climb up the ladders and tear them off the manholes."

Other animals caught on camera included bats, armadillos and 12 species of birds.

## Yes, we have bananas & a poisonous snake

Feb. 17 (UPI) — A conservation officer was called to a New Hampshire grocery store where a shipment of bananas was found to be concealing an "unwanted hitchhiker" — a venomous snake.

The New Hampshire Fish and Game Law Enforcement Division said a conservation officer arrived at Manchester Market Basket store following a report of a small snake in a banana shipment.

The division said on social media that the "unwanted hitchhiker" was an ornate cat-eyed snake, a venomous species native to Ecuador.

The 2-foot-long snake was turned over to the care of Rainforest Reptile Shows.

"In New Hampshire, any venomous snake aside from the hog-nosed snake is illegal to possess," Conservation Officer Griffin McKeown told WMUR-TV. "We've had a few calls about pet surrenders of ball pythons and stuff like that, but never, never a venomous snake. That's definitely a first for me."

Mack Ralbovsky, vice president of Rainforest Reptile Shows, said the snake is venomous, but not especially dangerous to humans.

"They're actually really adapted to eating things like lizards and amphibians," Ralbovsky said.

## Oklahoman has home filled with 'bric-a-brac'

Feb. 17 (UPI) — An Oklahoma man's family surprised him with a Guinness World Record for his collection of 8,882 different bricks.

Clem Reinkemeyer, 87, was out of town when his daughter, Celia, and son-in-law, Dan Bisett, gathered a group of friends to count and document each item in his Tulsa brick barn.

Reinkemeyer returned home and was surprised with an official certificate for the world's largest collection of bricks.

"I got back in town and it was a big surprise, and I'm

very happy to have this certificate," he told Guinness World Records.

Reinkemeyer's collection, which he has been amassing for 40 years, includes a Roman brick from A.D. 100, but most date from the last few hundred years.

"The break tide for making the bricks was about maybe 1870 to 1910," he said. "A special kind of brick like this has a certain clay that withstands heat, and everybody needed a fireplace."



He said some of his most valuable bricks are those with misspellings, such as one that reads "Tulsa" with a backward "s."

"I think Oklahoma has a history for the most misspelled bricks," he said. "I don't know why."

The collector said one of his favorites is a sidewalk brick made at a Washington facility located where the Pentagon now stands.

"There may be some of these under the Pentagon," he said. "But I think that this is one of a kind."

He said bricks interest him because of the history they hold.

"What appealed to me about bricks is, they have names and you can trace them back historically to places, and that always intrigued me. Its unusual, but I like it," he said.

## \$50,000 was layin' around the house

Feb. 17 (UPI) — A Maryland man won a \$50,000 prize from a Pick 5 lottery drawing, but he ended up claiming his prize less than a week before it would have expired.

The Prince George's County man told Maryland Lottery officials he made his usual stop at the 2 Go Convenience and Deli in Savage to buy tickets for the Pick 4 and Pick 5 drawings in August.

One of his Pick 5 tickets turned out to be a \$50,000 winner in the Aug. 21 drawing.

"I got the print out from a local store and checked the tickets when I got home," he said. "When I saw my numbers, I just couldn't believe it." The player said he decided not to claim his prize right away. "I just wanted to hold on to it," he said. "But, I'll tell you I sure was excited about it."

The man ended up claiming his prize with mere days left on the 182-day deadline this month.

"He didn't even tell me until yesterday," the winner's wife said. "I was shocked he had that winning ticket this whole time."

The man said his plans for his winnings include home improvements, a gift for his wife and possibly a new car.

## Wrong ticket—but surprise, surprise! for \$2 million winner

Feb. 18 (UPI) — A Virginia woman won a \$2 million lottery prize thanks to a store clerk who mistakenly gave her the wrong ticket.

Carrollton resident Kelly Lindsay told Virginia Lottery officials she was initially unhappy when a clerk at Race Way Carrollton on Carrollton



Boulevard handed her a Money Blitz scratch-off ticket instead of the ticket she wanted.

Lindsay took the ticket out to the parking lot and scratched it off, revealing a \$2 million top prize.

"And I got over not being happy about it," Lindsay said. Lindsay chose to receive her prize as a one-time, lump-sum payment of \$1,250,000 before taxes.

## World's record for pre-computer era slide charts

Feb. 19 (UPI) — A Pennsylvania man earned a Guinness World Records title for his collection of some unusual curiosities: slide charts.

Harrisburg resident Dale Rupert said he started collecting slide charts — handheld paper or plastic items that help with common calculations — when he found a box of them for sale at a used bookstore in 2002.

"I pulled one up. I thought, 'Oh, that's sort of cool. I think I'll get that.' And as I thought further, I realized, 'Oh, I can get this whole box for under 10 bucks.' And that's when the collection began," he told WGAL-TV.

Rupert said his collection of slide charts — and their similar cousins, wheel charts — now numbers 3,117.

He earned the Guinness World Record for the largest collection of slide charts by submitting 1,111 eligible charts to be counted.

Rupert's collection includes charts designed to convert measurements, track NFL football schedules and even a 1970 Miss Clairol chart for determining the proper formulas for hair coloring.

"Somebody did all the math, did all the pre-calculations, printed it on this, and now I have those answers right here in my hand," he said.

## Kicking and screaming — pulled out of meeting

A woman had been heckling speakers and speaking out at a town-hall meeting hosted by local Republicans in Coeur d'Alene, a small city in northern Idaho. The local sheriff asked her to leave, even pulling at her arm at one point and threatening to arrest her, according to videos from the event that have been published online.

Next, men wearing black jackets, and not known to be affiliated with local law enforcement, descended upon the woman, pulled her off the chair and to the floor while she cried out, asking who the men were, using an expletive.

They eventually dragged her out of the auditorium.

The woman, Teresa Borrenpohl, a former Democratic candidate for state office in Idaho, argued that everyone should be allowed to speak at a local political event. But organizers of the meeting with state legislators, which was hosted by the Kootenai County Republican Central Committee, said that she repeatedly refused to follow the rules.

The security firm's business license has been revoked for violating city ordinances, which include a provision that requires security personnel uniforms be clearly and visibly marked with the word "Security," Sergeant Reneau said.

The male victim, 30, was at his residence when the known suspects battered him and stole his property. The suspects vandalized the victim's vehicle before fleeing. The victim sustained non-life-threatening injuries. SUSPECTS: Two Black male adults.

**Person Stabbed** 5700 Block of Loraine Avenue, Valley Oak District

The male victim, 30, was seated in his vehicle with the known suspect. The suspect stabbed the victim with a knife and attempted to steal his vehicle. The victim was able to stop the suspect from leaving, and officers took the suspect into custody without incident. The victim was treated at a local hospital for a non-life-threatening injury. ARRESTED: Tatianna Garner, 18, for attempted carjacking and assault with a deadly weapon.

**Weapon Arrest** Hazelton Avenue and California Street, Seaport District

Officers attempted to stop a subject in the area of the CL and the subject fled on foot. Officers were able to detain the subject, where he was found to be in possession of a firearm. ARRESTED: Kenyon Pierce, 40, for weapon violations.

**Pursuit Arrest** Wilson Way and Sanguinetti Road, Park District

Officers attempted a traffic stop of a vehicle in the listed area. The driver failed to yield, leading officers on a pursuit. The pursuit was terminated for safety reasons. ## Murder suspect found

On November 9, 2024, at approximately 8:47 p.m., a female victim, 22, was transported to an area hospital with what appeared to be a gunshot wound. Officers learned the shooting occurred in the 1700 block of W Fremont St. The victim later succumbed to her injuries at the hospital. Detectives were advised and assumed the investigation.

Arrest Update:

Detectives have continued to conduct follow-up investigation since the homicide occurred on November 9, 2024. Detectives identified a suspect in the case as Damian Ortega, 18. On February 21, 2025, the Alameda County Sheriff's Office Deputies, with the Gang Suppression Unit, arrested Ortega in unincorporated Hayward, CA. On February 25, 2025, Ortega was booked into the San Joaquin County Jail for homicide and robbery. Officials thank the Alameda County Sheriff's Office and their Deputies for their assistance in this homicide arrest. This remains an ongoing investigation
